CORNELL-HUNTER HEALTH EQUITY RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP

The mission of the Weill Cornell – Hunter College Health Equity Research Fellowship is to provide postdoctoral training for researchers in primary care, inpatient care, and health services research focused on health equity. This innovative mentored research fellowship engages physicians, Ph.D.s, and nurses who aim to become extramurally funded independent health services researchers with a research program focused on health equity. Our program is uniquely designed to deepen trainees' understanding of health care, local and international healthcare delivery systems, epidemiology of disease, and interventions to improve health outcomes, especially health equity. We offer four focus areas: Primary Care, Health System Redesign, Community-Partnered Research, and Global Health. The two- to three-year fellowship is led by Monika M. Safford, M.D., Margaret L. McNairy, M.D., M.Sc., and Elizabeth Cohn, Ph.D., R.N. The program will provide trainees with the skills to design and conduct patient-centered and health systems research focused on health equity, and to prepare for NIH K-award submissions by the end of the program.

Fellowship Details

- Tailored one-on-one faculty mentorship from a multidisciplinary team of faculty at Weill Cornell Medicine, Cornell University, and Hunter College.
- Collaboration opportunities through the Cornell Center of Health Equity, the Weill Cornell Center for Global Health, the Sandra and Edward Meyer Cancer Center, Cornell Tech, and other affiliated programs.
- Vibrant, supportive environment created by our Diversity Center of Excellence.
- Two to three-year fellowship duration depending on prior training of the candidate.
- Master of Science degree in Clinical Epidemiology and Health Services Research sponsored by the Weill Cornell Graduate School of Medical Sciences for fellows without prior formal training.
- Clinical patient care with Weill Cornell Hospital Medicine or Outpatient Primary Care.
- Access to clinical training in clinical teaching and point-of-care ultrasound.
- Competitive salary and benefits.
- Funded in part through a T32 grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration.

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HOSPITAL MEDICINE CLINICAL POINT OF CARE ULTRASOUND FELLOWSHIP

The mission of the Hospital Medicine Clinical Point of Care Ultrasound Fellowship at NewYork-Presbyterian/Weill Cornell is to train leaders in basic and advanced point of care ultrasound. This 1-year fellowship program is led by Tanping Wong, M.D. and Gregory Mints, M.D.

Our POCUS faculty have helped set the national standards for certification, taught at national meetings, and currently organize and teach the leading five-day training program offered to participants from across the country and internationally.

Although described as a fellowship program, participants will be hired as hospital medicine faculty within the Weill Department of Medicine at Weill Cornell.

Fellowship Objectives

- Achieve proficiency in basic and advanced point of care ultrasound
- Obtain Society of Hospital Medicine (SMH) certification in basic POCUS.
- Achieve proficiency in bedside ultrasound guided procedures
- Learn how to organize, manage, and promote an academic ultrasound-guided procedure service
- Achieve proficiency in teaching point of care ultrasound to students, residents, physician assistants, and faculty
- Learn the processes for assuring, documenting, and certifying proficiency
- Gain experience in organizing and leading a monthly educational conference in POCUS
- Present and participate in a monthly journal club on POCUS literature
- Gain experience in how ultrasonography is used in specialty fields like radiology, critical care, cardiology, and emergency medicine
- Participate in POCUS research with the goal of presenting results at a national meeting

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INTEGRATIVE HEALTH AND WELLBEING FELLOWSHIP

The fellowship is designed to offer comprehensive education and hands-on experience in the field of Integrative Medicine. Prospective fellows are individuals looking to augment their clinical practice, or those looking to transition into practice of Integrative Medicine. The fellowship includes clinical teaching and experience in the field, participation in interdisciplinary clinical discussions, and mentorship of medical students and residents. In addition, the fellowship includes the completion of the online curriculum developed by the University of Arizona, including online modules and off-site residential weeks. The fellow will receive mentorship needed to develop and complete a clinical, research, and/or educational project of his or her choosing during the fellowship.

A one-year option is available to candidates who have begun the online curriculum by the calendar year preceding the beginning of the fellowship.

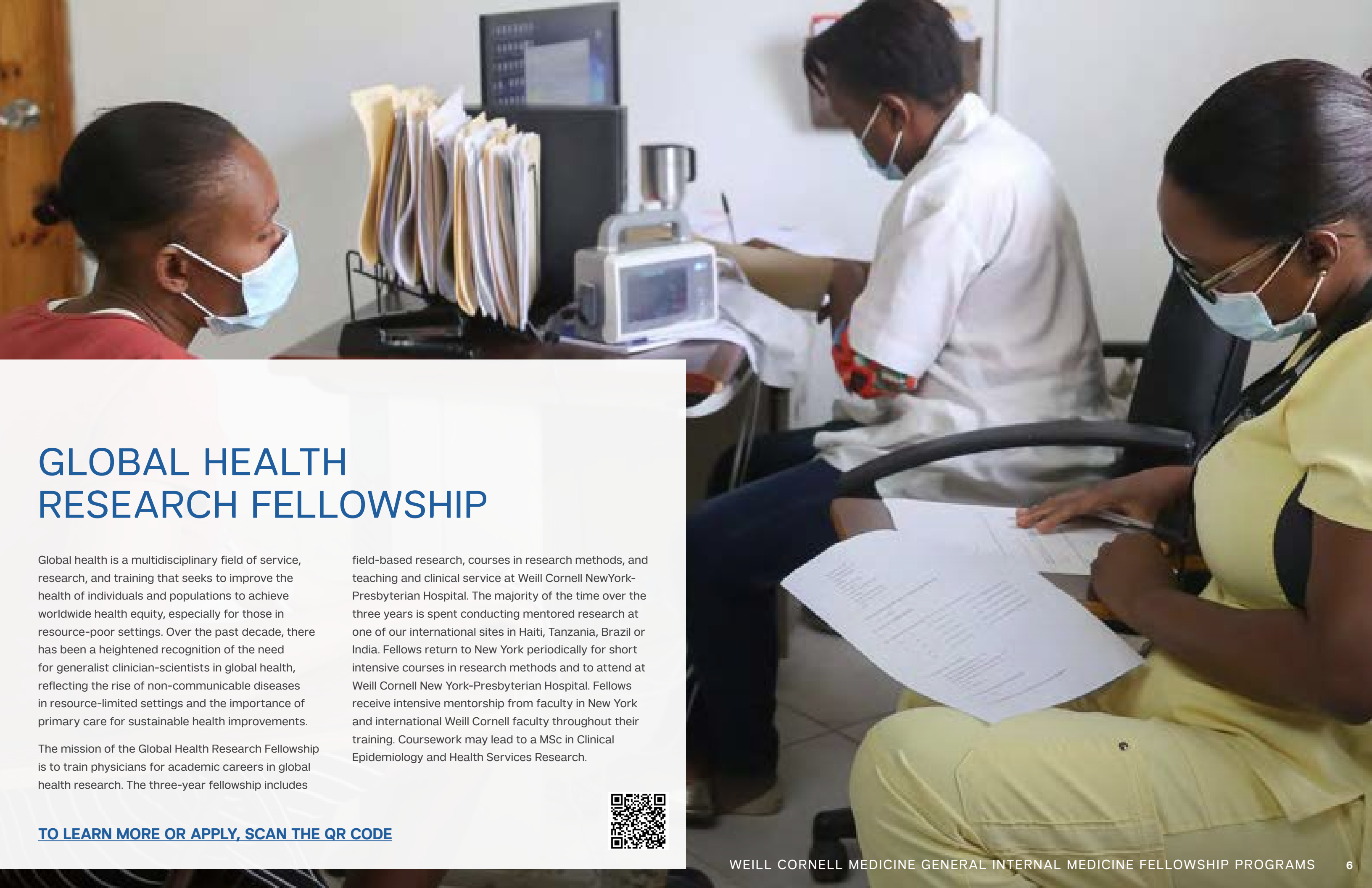
This fellowship has been granted full recognition by the American Board of Integrative Medicine (ABOIM), a member board of the American Board of Physician Specialties.

GLOBAL HEALTH RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP

Global health is a multidisciplinary field of service, research, and training that seeks to improve the health of individuals and populations to achieve worldwide health equity, especially for those in resource-poor settings. Over the past decade, there has been a heightened recognition of the need for generalist clinician-scientists in global health, reflecting the rise of non-communicable diseases in resource-limited settings and the importance of primary care for sustainable health improvements.

The mission of the Global Health Research Fellowship is to train physicians for academic careers in global health research. The three-year fellowship includes

field-based research, courses in research methods, and teaching and clinical service at Weill Cornell New York-Presbyterian Hospital. The majority of the time over the three years is spent conducting mentored research at one of our international sites in Haiti, Tanzania, Brazil or India. Fellows return to New York periodically for short intensive courses in research methods and to attend at Weill Cornell New York-Presbyterian Hospital. Fellows receive intensive mentorship from faculty in New York and international Weill Cornell faculty throughout their training. Coursework may lead to a MSc in Clinical Epidemiology and Health Services Research.

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ADDICTION FELLOWSHIP

The Weill Cornell Medicine one-year, ACGME-accredited Addiction Medicine Fellowship enables one Internal Medicine trained physician each academic year to develop addiction medicine practice knowledge and skills, participate in addiction-related research and teach junior trainees.

We offer intensive training in diverse clinical settings, extensive formal didactics, expert faculty supervision and experience teaching medicine residents and medical students.

Program Curriculum

The program's curriculum will comprise of:

- **Mentored patient care:** Fellows will learn to apply evidence-based and innovative addiction treatment under the supervision of experienced faculty. For example, Fellows will complete mentored acute and rehabilitative inpatient experiences, outpatient substance use programs and opioid treatment programs. Training will also be provided in pain management in collaboration with our pain management division.
- **Mentored research:** Fellows will have the opportunity to conduct a research project and participate in on-going addiction research with the goal of presenting to co-fellows and faculty at the end of the academic year.
- **Mentored education training:** Fellows will gain experience as educators. They will work with and educate other clinicians, residents, and medical students both in formal didactics and informal clinical settings.

Unique to Weill Cornell Medicine's program will be the focus on the stigma of addiction as well as the intersection of pain and addiction. Fellows will have the opportunity to engage in community rehabilitation and outreach programs around the New York City area.

Through the Addiction Medicine curriculum and close mentorship, Weill Cornell's Addiction Medicine Fellows will be empowered to be leaders in the field of addiction.
